The Twelfth Annual Ozarks Symposium

"Social Architecture and Foundations of the Ozarks" September 20-22, 2018

The theme of the 12th annual Ozarks Studies Symposium is "Social Architecture and Foundations of the Ozarks." All presentations will be held at the West Plains Civic Center, are free of charge, and the community is invited to attend.

The symposium will feature presentations by scholars, writers, artists and musicians who will provide insight into many facets of the Ozarks.

Dr. Jason McCollom, assistant professor of History at MSU-WP and symposium coordinator, emphasized the exciting slate of presenters. "This year's theme is designed to include a wide variety of topics on the history and influences of Ozarks socio-cultural life," he said, "And the community can learn from a variety of presentations on the theme. I think this year's topics will give us insight to the foundation and structures of our Ozarks culture.



Keynote Address: "Sage and Osage: Donald Harington and the Long History of the Ozarks "

The symposium's keynote address will be given at 4 p.m. Friday, Sept. 22, by Brian D. Walter, Ph. D., Professor of English, St. Louis College of Pharmacy

In his 1986 nonfiction novel *Let Us* Build Us a City, Donald Harington deepens the failed dreams of European settlers who optimistically named their little communities "cities" by invoking the much older and more resonant artistic traditions of the first human inhabitants of the Mississippi basin:

In this philosophically conservative view of time and history, Harington emphasizes the organic genius of Native Americans' allegedly "primitive" art, as he does throughout his novels, consistently honoring the profound work of their imaginations even when it appears only as ruins and remnants, vestiges of human cultures.

"Rocks and Red Clay" Exhibit by Barbara Williams to Highlight 2018 Symposium Opening Reception



WPCA will host an exhibit presentation on Thursday, September 20, from 5-7 p.m., in the Gallery at the Center, during the opening reception for the Ozarks Studies Symposium. All are invited to attend, view and discuss these wonderful pieces.

The exhibit "Rocks and Red

Clay" by artist Barbara Williams will be displayed at the Gallery at the Center, West Plains Civic Center from September 10-30, 2018. The Gallery, on the mezzanine, is open to the public during regular Civic Center hours.

Williams was born at Myrtle, Missouri, where her family has been rooted for many generations. She received art degrees from (Southwest) Missouri State University, Springfield and Southern Illinois University, Carbondale. Upon graduation she traveled extensively to add to her arts knowledge.

Since undergraduate school until now the people and material culture of the Ozarks continue as a central theme of her art. Beginning as cathartic portraits of family, a slow steady pursuit of this theme has resulted in widely exhibited paintings, prints (etchings), mixed media paintings, and photographs. An iconic etching titled "Robert, Georgie, Minnie, Troy, Lois, Nita, Lucille, Henry, Jerry, Dean, Maxine, Barbara, Norma, Nona, Sue," a 'snapshot' of a rural Ozarks family having their portrait made, has been shown in national exhibits, including one at the Smithsonian Institute, and in international exhibits in Italy, Germany, Poland, England and Yugoslavia.

Portions of proofs of etchings formed the basis of many new pieces in mixed media collage paintings; recently the ancient medium of encaustic has been added to the mix.

The year 2000 was the beginning of a series documenting, drawing, painting and photographing Ozarks rock buildings (native stone masonry). Numerous exhibits, slide presentations, magazine articles, and two Ozarks Public Television programs have been presented on this subject (viewable on the OPTV, KOZK website). Forthcoming is a picture book on this subject.

Upon returning to the Ozarks in the 1980's, three arts festivals were organized in West Plains under The Arts Center Committee name. Williams organized the committee and festivals toward realizing her decades long dream of forming a site called DOMINION, a folk arts retreat center in the Ozarks. That major dream has yet to be realized but she steadily works toward it.

The exhibit is co-sponsored by the West Plains Civic Center and West Plains Council on the Arts, with partial funding provided by Missouri Arts Council, a state agency.



"A Year in the Ozarks" The Works of Kathryn Fisher

West Plains Council on the Arts (WPCA) will host an exhibition of works by artist Kathryn Fisher entitled "A Year in the Ozarks" at the Gallery at the Center, West Plains Civic Center from January 21 through February 10, 2019. The Gallery, on the mezzanine, is open to the public during regular Civic Center hours.

After thirty years as a successful textile artist, Kathryn Fisher shifted from painting with thickened dye on cotton cloth to painting in oil paint on linen canvas. Her work is usually impressionistic with a lean toward expressionism, although she sometimes paints in other styles as well. She has studied with notable artists such as Carolyn Anderson, Laura Robb, Quang Ho, C.W. Mundy, Matt Smith and T. Allen Lawson. Her work encompasses landscapes, animals, still life and figurative paintings. She accepts commissions for paintings as well. Her purpose is to see beauty even in unexpected places and to bring the viewer the joy that she found in the moment. She is a member of the American Impressionist Society.

Fisher's recent awards received from juried shows include Illinois River Salon 2017, Award of Merit; Illinois River Salon 2016, Best in Show; American Impressionist Society, 2016, First Annual "Impressions Small Works Showcase"; and Hoosier Salon, 2015 Field to Finish Award.

She is the recipient of numerous awards. Bottrell-Parks currently teaches weekly classes at Splatter Art Studio in Springfield, MO and specialty workshops in the area.

"My work has been predominantly realistic portraits of people and animals in graphite, charcoal, pastel or acrylic. I've always been intrigued with bringing a piece of paper or canvas to life with a portrait. There is something so captivating drawing life and it gives me such a rush that I hurry back to do it all over again! Creating is a calming therapy in a chaotic world. I love to create for the sheer joy it brings. It is also the reason I love to teach, so my students can experience this joy too!", says the artist.
