

The 14th Annual Ozarks Studies Symposium "Creation in the Ozarks" September 23-25, 2021

Presented by the Missouri State University-West Plains Ozarks Studies Committee, all Symposium presentations will be held

at the West Plains Civic Center, are free of charge, and the community is invited to attend.



The Ozarks region is experiencing significant shifts in its appearance, people, land and longtime traditions.

Cue Kaitlyn McConnell: An Ozarks storysharer. It is her goal to capture many of these stories before they are gone.

Since 2015, Kaitlyn has written more than 400 stories about people, traditions, history and unique sites through Ozarks Alive, a website dedicated to the documentation of local culture and history. Through the site, she works to preserve and share pieces of the region's fabric so that it creates awareness for today and also a footprint to learn from in the future.

In this presentation, she will share more about the site's work and goals, and as well as observations from her travels throughout the region, and she will focus on some of the unique people and places of this changing region that shouldn't be forgotten.

As a seventh-generation Ozarker, Kaitlyn's love of the region goes deep. She is a native of Webster County, where she grew up on the farm her great-great-grandmother bought in the early 1900s. She began sharing the Ozarks when she was 17, when she wrote a weekly column about local history for The Marshfield Mail newspaper, and for which she was recognized as The History Channel's Student of the Year. She currently works as System Director of Public Relations for CoxHealth.

"Ozark Landscape and Nature Photography" Exhibit by Carr Ward Highlights 2021 Symposium Opening Reception



West Plains Council on the Arts (WPCA) will host an exhibition of works by local photographer Carr Ward, entitled "Ozark Landscape and Nature Photography." The exhibit will be displayed at the Gallery at the Center, West Plains Civic Center from September 12 through October 17, 2021.

Carr Ward is a landscape and nature photographer living in West Plains, MO. He began his serious photography pursuit eleven years ago while working construction on the road. Ward loved taking photos even before it was popular to post on social media, but his passion for photography came by accident or possibly divine providence.

Ward says, "I had just purchased my first digital camera the day before my third child was born so I could photograph the birth. That very day after her birth I was out in the hospital's flower beds taking pictures of their flowers. I had had a 35mm camera and used it a lot during my time in the Navy, but after shooting with the digital camera and instantly being able to see what I was doing, I was hooked. I began looking at the work of professional photographers and my desire to shoot like them is what has driven me to where I am today... that and my faith in God. I love being in nature and photographing in ways that capture how I see things around me. I love looking for compositions that are naturally there, bringing all the elements around the subject into one photo." (Contd. on page 2)

Contd. Carr Ward Exhibit

Dennis Crider says, "Carr Ward has quickly become one of my favorite photographers, and he is what you might call 'the new kid on the block,' because I don't believe he has been at it very long. But in this short time, he has produced some images that make old timers like me take notice. One look at his images and you ask, 'how did he do that?' He takes his editing skills to a different dimension, and he is very good at what he does. He has perfected the Orton Effect which gives the final image a soft and dreamy look. No doubt he is armed with state-of-the-art equipment, and he possesses a great work ethic because he gets out to his waterfalls long before the sun gets up. But better yet, he has the eye that is necessary to produce such great work."

For his landscape images Ward uses a Canon 5DS R with a 16-35mm lens. For all other shots - the Canon 5D Mark IV with the following lenses - 180mm macro, 100mm macro, 70-200mm, 24 -70mm, Feisol tripod and all photos are processed in Photoshop CC.

WPCA will host the Opening Reception for the Ozarks Studies Symposium from 5:30-7:00 p.m., Thursday, September 23, in the Gallery at the Center. Carr Ward's exhibit will be featured. All are invited to attend, meet the artist, and discuss the pieces. The exhibit is co-sponsored by the West Plains Civic Center and West Plains Council on the Arts, with partial funding provided by Missouri Arts Council, a state agency.



SPENCER MEAGHER WATERCOLOR WORKSHOP TO BE OFFERED IN NOVEMBER



West Plains Arts Alliance members, the West Plains Council on the Arts (WPCA) and the Harlin Museum of West Plains (Harlin), will bring renowned artist Spencer Meagher to town for a three-day watercolor workshop. The workshop will be held 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. daily, November 11, 12, and 13, 2021, in the Hathcock Gallery at the Harlin, 405 Worcester Ave. in West Plains.

WPCA Coordinator Janey Hale says, "Spencer Meager is a versatile artist in both subject matter and media. His paintings depict scenes from everyday life that create a sense of time and place for the viewer. With any of his chosen media Spencer is able to capture with color and value the essential elements of his subjects."

Spencer Meagher first discovered his love for art as a young child. He found he was able to express himself through drawing and painting. He refined his skills over many decades with practice and dedication. As an adult, he has attended many workshops to gain a better understanding of his craft. Spencer now paints full time and travels all over the country attending competitions and shows, as well as teaching workshops. Spencer is a Plein Air and studio artist who works in watercolor, oil and acrylic. When he is not traveling, he works out of his studio in Mt. Vernon, IL.

Meagher's work has taken top awards in art competitions around the country and has been exhibited in many notable galleries. His paintings have been featured in publications such as Southwest Art, Plein Air Magazine, and Plein Air Today; and mentioned in numerous online articles. Meagher has studied with renowned artists Alvaro Castagnet, Graham Berry, John P. Lasater IV, Joseph Fettingis, Lon Brauer, M. Shawn Cornell, and Sterling Edwards.

Spencer Meagher's artist statement: "Deep within my spirit lies a need to express myself that can only be realized through my art. My paintings are an enhanced glimpse into how I view the world around me. I tend to avoid the details and let the color and value tell the story."



Ozarks Heritage Resource Center (OHRC)

Years in the making, the OHRC will house an archive of materials related to the south-central and southeast Missouri Ozarks that can be used by researchers, regional history enthusiasts and students when it opens in the lower level of the Garnett Library in 2022 on the campus of Missouri State University-West Plains.

The archive will include documents and visual resources that represent the history and cultural heritage of the region, including materials written by and about Missourians, according to Dr. Jason McCollom, associate professor of history at MSU-WP and one of center's advisory committee members.

"The OHRC will be a place where instructors can bring their students to teach them research skills, to study Ozarks culture and history, and to explore the ways in which an archive functions," McCollom explained. "It also will provide one-of-a-kind materials to the public.

"In addition, the collections will aid faculty and staff seeking local and regional materials for a variety of projects, presentations or grant opportunities, and scholars and academics from across the nation researching a variety of Ozarks topics will find primary sources and archival materials to inform their publications, studies and projects," he added.

"Ultimately, we hope the OHRC will become a one-of-a-kind hub in the region for creating a documentable and usable past of our area, promote educational resources, and sponsor speakers and workshops," he explained.
