Old-Time Music, Ozark Heritage Festival scheduled for June 3 and 4, 2022



Saturday, March 12— 5:30-8:00 p.m. West Plains Civic Center Arena and Exhibit Hall

WEST PLAINS, Mo. — Craft brewers, distributors, and area restaurants and farmers' markets will highlight the Annual West Plains BrewFest, set for 5:30 to 8 p.m. Saturday, March 12, 2022, in the Arena and Exhibit Hall at the West Plains Civic Center. Doors will open promptly at 5:30.

Individual glasses will be provided at each table for onetime use. All attendees will be eligible for door prize giveaway items supplied by the vendors, which will include t-shirts, glasses, growlers, gift certificates, and more.

Attendees will have the opportunity to sample craft beers from a wide range of breweries, organizers said. Confirmations are still coming in, but thus far confirmed are participating Missouri craft breweries Boulevard Brewing and Kansas City Bier Co. of Kansas City; Crane Brewing of Raytown; Mother's Brewing and Springfield Brewing of Springfield; O'Fallon Brewing of O'Fallon; Piney River Brewery of Bucyrus; Public House Brewing of Rolla; Schlafly Brewing of St. Louis; and Wages Brewing of West Plains. St. James Winery will be participating with some specially chosen wines.

Great Rivers Distributing is bringing products from Anheuser Busch, O'Fallon Brewing, Springfield Brewing, Kansas City Bier Co., and more to be announced,

Grellner Sales & Service will feature products from the breweries they represent.

In addition to the craft beers and wines, attendees will enjoy a variety of samples from many area restaurants and farmers market members. Confirmed as of February 23 are Bootlegger's BBQ, Charlie's Tamales, Coffee Doctor, Foodie's Fare, Grump's Grub, Kiko Japanese Steakhouse and Sushi Lounge, Lil Bits Bakery, Ozark Pizza & Bread Company, Ruby Tuesday's, Snider's Family Restaurant, and Sole Café at Grizzly Lofts. West Plains Area Farmers Market's Jolliff Farm, Kelly Hollow Farms, and Thunder Mountain Farm will offer an assortment of their featured products.

Proceeds from the event will benefit the West Plains Council on the Arts' efforts to promote arts organizations in the West Plains area, as well as fund the Gatewood Family Fine Arts Scholarship. The event is being sponsored by the West Plains Council on the Arts, Brewer's Ice Co., Great Rivers Distributing, Grellner Sales & Service, and the West Plains Daily Quill.

T-Shirts will be available, printed on-site by Ink Monkey Screen Printing and Graphics. DJ Services will be provided by Bill Talley of SoundWorx. Water and soft drinks are provided by PepsiCo.

Admission is \$25 per person in advance and \$35 at the door. All attendees must be over 21 and have a valid photo ID. OZARKS DEEP - ART AND CULTURE TRAILS

WEST PLAINS STORY TOUR

West Plains Council on the Arts (WPCA) continues to invest in our region's infrastructure for folk and traditional arts. In spring 2020, we were awarded a grant from the West Plains

Program to develop a program of art and culture trails based in West Plains. The "Ozarks Deep: Art & Culture Trails" combines successful projects with new resources to expand the cultural tourism capacity of the Ozarks region and improve the vitality of our own community. The project will allow the city and regional organizations to promote current assets and be a gateway for future cultural journeys.

The first trail created is called "Ozarks Deep: Story Trail" - where the community stories link with artistic traditions passed down generations, to turn a place into a destination, an experience, for both local residents and visitors as well.

The Story Trail is a combination of history, imagination, and creative use of the community stories that have been passed down through generations. They are the stories that make us unique as well as universal.

We began with existing material that was part of the Old-Time Music, Ozark Heritage Festival. The "West Plains Story Tour" is a guided bus tour of downtown West Plains, which was created for the festival by local residents deeply connected to the history and stories of the region. Building on that foundation, we worked with local artists, historians, tradition bearers, and storytellers to combine existing material with new narratives and additional tour sites, to include more depth, more voices, and more stories.

In fall, 2020, the National Endowment for the Arts (NEA) awarded WPCA a grant to support the production of the West Plains Story Tour and simultaneously create an Artist's Showcase, a sampling of musicians, dancers, occupational artists who have been selected in the past to perform, demonstrate, or exhibit at the Old-Time Music, Ozark Heritage Festival. WPCA worked with approximately 30 artists to create this Artist's Showcase. Both the West Plains Story Tour and the Artists' Showcase are virtual elements of "Ozarks Deep: Story Trail", intended to increase accessibility throughout the year, bringing economic benefits to the artists and greater visibility to the creative community.

The entire tour will be uploaded and available after being featured at the 2022 Old-Time Music, Ozark Heritage Festival.

People often ask, "What did people do before they had television?"

They brought the fiddle out of the closet, rolled up the rugs and started the music. If they were called to dance, they danced. If there were biscuits and hot cane sorghum around, they headed for the kitchen table, with requests for more. They went to the deer woods, called up the wild turkey. They caught sucker fish with iron gigs, long poles, and flat-bottomed boats, then cooked them up on the sand bars of the river, sharing stories, secrets, and recipes for green tomato relish, served up with a big helping of music around the bonfire that held caldrons of fish, potatoes, onions, and corn dodgers (hush puppies). Growing up in a small town is itself a story, but when you can see the incandescence of the wild azalea bloom that inspired the song "Fire on the Mountain" and hear the bluegrass-style rendition of that song in the same day, it is more than a story. It is an experience.

The Old-Time Music, Ozark Heritage Festival has become a vehicle for dissemination, transmission, and conservation of those experiences. Culture is an important part of every-day life, yet we are finding more and more things taking the place of the front porch, the kitchen table, the riverbanks, the country churches. The stories however are more vital than ever because we live in an age of access to instant information, and sensory overload.

Perhaps we long for the kind of connection that comes from listening to something genuine. The new digital mediums have become necessary vehicles for sharing and conservation at the same time. It is different from the live performance, the multisensory experience, but our virtual world can offer benefits and opportunities —sharing and listening to people, visiting places that were unimaginable or inaccessible in the past. And it reminds us that we are not only the living descendants of this unique culture, but we hold and embody the living remnants of an otherwise disappearing part of American life.

We expect this effort will generate more community involvement in the planning, organizing and administration of the Ozarks Deep, Art and Culture Trails, and to inspire a group of "Friends of Cultural Tourism". This group will focus on long range sustainability, growth, creating additional "Trails", and reaching into the Ozarks Deep for other diverse voices to include.

Finally, we are grateful for the collaborations that made these productions of the West Plains Story Tour and the Artists' Showcase possible. In addition to the City of West Plains and the National Endowment for the Arts, Missouri State University – West Plains provided resources of the Ozarks Heritage Resource Center, and University Communications to the production efforts. We are also indebted to all those who gave us time, encouragement and trust with their stories, their photos, their memories, and their conversations.

Both the Story Tour and the Artists Showcase will be featured at the Old-Time Music, Ozark Heritage Festival, June 3 & 4, 2022.

CALL FOR SUBMISSIONS "EN PLEIN AIR" EXHIBIT

West Plains Council on the Arts (WPCA) has issued a call for submissions for their juried "en plein air" exhibit. WPCA will host the exhibition of works in the Gallery

at the Center, West Plains Civic Center from May 7 through June 18, 2022. The Gallery, on the mez-

zanine, is open to the public during regular Civic Center hours.

Plein air artist and WPCA board member Janey Hale says, "Wind, rain, heat or cold will not keep an artist who loves to paint en plein air inside. Any artist who loves to paint directly from nature has experienced all its variations but will endure to capture that special moment in time and place."

WPCA will showcase works that have been created "en plein air" by area artists to highlight the unique challenges this artform brings. Area artists are requested to email photos of up to six (6) proposed works to info@westplainsarts.org before April 1 to be considered. The number of pieces allowed per artist will depend on total submissions accepted.

A virtual showcase will be prepared and shared online after the exhibit is finalized.

Guidelines for entries:

16"x20" maximum size preferred. Indicate size with each entry. Must have been painted on location, not from a photo. Pieces must be framed and/or ready to hang.

WPCA will host a Meet the Artist event on Saturday, May 14, from 2-4 p.m., in the Gallery at the Center. All are invited to attend, meet the artists, and discuss the pieces. 

GATEWOOD FAMILY FINE ARTS SCHOLARSHIP

West Plains Council on the Arts has been providing support and assistance to arts endeavors in the West Plains area since 1975. Our mission is to stimulate and foster public participation in cultural activities, and to disseminate the knowledge and product of such cultural activities to the public in order to broaden the appreciation and availability of the arts in the West Plains region.

WPCA provides educational programs which support innovation and creative expression in the arts; presents artists and art forms that promote artistic and cultural diversity; provides guidance, resources and infrastructure to develop non-profit community-based arts groups; and sponsors festivals, competitions and awards to promote and support artists; and to celebrate and preserve the traditional culture of the region.

WPCA, in cooperation with the Gatewood Family, has established this scholarship to encourage students of the highest caliber to enter a career in the fine arts, with special emphasis on arts education.
